REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN For the Year Ended 31 March 2014

This AGM comes after WREN's third full year of activity. WREN was established on the simple proposition that localising our approximately £14m local energy economy would produce substantial local benefits including greater economic resilience, improved quality of life, and enhanced future jobs prospects for our children. The third year of WREN's programmes has provided strong encouragement, firstly that local people are sympathetic to these opportunities, and secondly that substantial impact is achievable.

Particular developments of note include the following activities and outputs:

- WREN, as a not-for-profit cooperative owned by its members, cannot work towards achieving these benefits without active local support. The largest single investment of time and resource during the year was therefore in activities that would develop a shared understanding of the benefits and disbenefits of creating a local energy economy. Funds received as part of WREN's Ashden Award were used to mount an exploratory exhibition, Wadebridge Energy Futures, from 19th-21st September 2013, designed to engage local people in a discussion about the options available to us, and the merits of greater energy self-sufficiency. Over 500 people attended, and strong approval for greater ownership and control over our energy supply, and for related opportunities, was expressed. Wadebridge Energy Futures culminated in a discussion evening with a panel of commentators including Sir Tim Smit, Professor Ann Carlisle, Peter Tuthill, and Cllr. Julian German, Portfolio Holder for Economy and Culture, Cornwall Council. The exhibition was transformed to virtual form by Impress51, and is available at http://www.wren.uk.com/virtual-exhibition.html.
- This positive response to the prospects for a local energy economy has encouraged the WREN Board to set in place arrangements to establish the Wadebridge Energy Company (echoing the Wadebridge Electricity Supply Company that was set up in 1926, and eventually was sold to the South West Electricity Board), which will become the local vehicle investing in, and benefiting from, local supply arrangements.
- WREN will continue to depend primarily upon voluntary input from its Board members and
 other volunteers, however this year the Board increased the capacity of WREN's
 professional core, with the contributions of three paid positions. These costs are met from
 income generation as WREN's activities expand, and from the Coastal Communities Fund.
 We have been very fortunate in securing exceptional recruits to our Operations Manager
 function initially Paul Holmes, and now Dominic Comonte.
- The WREN intern programme has continued to be successful, with three interns who have all gone onto relevant employment or further education.
- WREN has continued to be recognised through awards, including the Ashden Award for Community Energy 2013 (the most prestigious, and sought after, recognition in this sector);
 Best Individual Leadership/ Best Community Renewable Energy Scheme, Cornwall Sustainability Awards 2013; Community Energy Champion, SW Green Energy Awards 2013.
- Membership has risen to over 1,000. WREN's objective is to extend membership to most households, as then WREN policies will be representative of local opinion, and benefits will be properly distributed.

- WREN distributed £5,000 of its own community fund, on the basis of members' votes, to Wadebridge and District Museum, First Wadebridge Guides, Wadebridge Foodbank and Storehouse, Wadebridge Primary Academy, North Cornwall and District Talking Newspaper Association, Polzeath Marine Conservation Group, Wadebridge Dementia Alliance, Wadebridge Memory Café, Second Wadebridge Brownies, Wadebridge Mothers Milk Café. WREN is also managing over £60,000 per annum community funds including those from the St Breock Windfarm, Treworder Solar Farm, and funds offered by the Hawkey family from the Olde House solar array.
- WREN has to date made significant impact upon local energy saving, local generation and renewable heat installations. WREN's formal procurement procedures have resulted in providing insulation for 128 homes, 650kW of solar PV in 88 installations, and 1MW biomass in 57 installations. These installations represent some £1,800,000 in capital value, and where appropriate this business has been made available to local companies. In addition WREN has facilitated and influenced some 3MW of installations.
- Some £5,000 value of Wrens (Wadebridge Pound) has been put into the local economy, and the Wren is accepted by over 50 local businesses.
- These outcomes represent an addition to the local economy of some £1,600,000 per annum, and annual carbon savings of some 2,340 tonnes. However it is important to stress that these impacts represent only entry level in terms of the overall potential value of a local energy market, and its consequent opportunities in terms of energy services, and the consequent wider economic investment.
- The WREN Board is working on the next practical steps in consolidating this potential. Work continues upon developing local supply arrangements with the Cornwall Development Company, Western Power Distribution, and others. Plans for the Smart Innovation Hub are being developed in collaboration with Cornwall Development Company, Falmouth University and commercial partners. The first share offers for local energy systems are being developed within the framework of the Wadebridge Energy Company.
- Following the strong support given to the options presented at the Wadebridge Energy
 Futures exhibition, relevant opportunities are being pursued in the context of the Smart
 Cornwall programme, where Wadebridge's role is established in developing a replicable
 model of the "Smart Market Town" whereby towns such as ours can recreate their past
 economic strength through novel opportunities.

A feature of the Wadebridge Energy Futures exhibition that attracted considerable attention was Wadebridge's extraordinary past as a centre of engineering innovation from the mid-nineteenth century onwards. In summary, despite an unstable and generally hostile policy environment, progress after three years is consistent with WREN, and Wadebridge, securing the benefits of a distributed energy system, benefits that will be enhanced by becoming early adopters. These developments will reinstate the town's nineteenth century standing as a centre of technological innovation.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was that of:

- The promotion of the conservation, protection and improvement of the natural environment and prudent use of the natural resources for the benefit of the public by:
 - a) Establishing a low carbon economy within Wadebridge and its surrounding parishes (a population of some 10,000 individuals);
 - b) Advancing education and raising awareness of energy resource scarcity and low carbon living
 - c) Promoting individual, community and organisational commitment to a reduction in CO₂ emissions for Wadebridge and increasing resilience to resource scarcity;
 - d) Energy saving;
 - e) Establishing the generation of renewable energy at range scales;
- The promotion of sustainable development for the public benefit by;
 - a) Enabling a percentage of revenue resulting from renewable energy generation to be invested in local community projects that meet local priorities as decided upon by the membership of WREN;
 - b) The promotion of sustainable means of achieving economic development and regeneration in order to reduce reliance on fossil fuels
- The prevention or the relief of poverty in Wadebridge and surrounding areas by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.
- Subjecting the process to rigorous evaluation by our academic partners (energy audit, process and outcome measures) so that such population's programmes can be generalised elsewhere.

STATEMENT OF THE DIRECTORS RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE DIRECTORS REPORT AND THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Directors Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations. The Cooperative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 effective 1 August 2014 (formerly Industrial and Provident Societies Act 1965) requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under those regulations the Directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with UK Accounting Standards. The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

Going Concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The directors also consider that it is appropriate to continue to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

Income

Income represents grants, donations, finder's fees and other income received or receivable. Income is recognised when received or according to the contractual obligation to receive funds.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the financial statements when funds are paid or according to the date of invoice if earlier.

Grants receivable – restricted

Grant income is recognised in the financial statements according to the earlier of when funds are received or the date an interim project claim is made. Monies due and not received at the year end are shown as debtors. A debtor is also recognised where project expenditure has been incurred and restricted funds are available to be claimed through that project.

Grant expenditure - restricted

Grant expenditure is recognised in the financial statements when the liability is incurred.

Reserves

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific projects which may be declared by the donor(s), or with their authority (e.g., in a public appeal), but still within the objects of the company. Restricted funds may be restricted income funds, which are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of some particular aspect(s) of the objects of the company, or they may be capital funds, where the assets are required to be invested, or retained for actual use, rather than expended.

The surplus arising on Big Design Challenge funds of £225 are not needed for completion of this project and neither are they required to be repaid to the fund provider. The surplus has been transferred to other restricted funds in 2013/14.

<u>Unrestricted funds</u> are expendable at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the company's objects. If part of an unrestricted fund is earmarked for a particular project it may be designated as a separate fund, but the designation has an administrative purpose only, and does not legally restrict the director's discretion to apply the fund.

9. LEASING COMMITMENTS

The company entered into a 24 month licence to occupy The Energy Shop on 1 May 2013 in the sum of £9,870 per annum (payable monthly). The licence is not to expire before 30 April 2015. Thereafter it may be terminated by either the licensee or licensor by giving 3 months notice.

The monthly rent due is to remain at the agreed level for a minimum period of 12 months, where after the Licensor may serve notice of a rent review.

10. WREN CURRENCY

The Wren currency was launched in November 2012. One Wren (Wr) equates to £1 sterling.

Wrens are issued by the Wadebridge Renewable energy Network (WREN) Ltd to people who take up WREN offers on energy efficiency or energy generation measures. The currency can also be purchased by the general public from the Energy Shop and used in over 50 participating businesses in the town.

Participating businesses have agreed that of every Wr25 that is redeemed by them, only 90% is refundable to the business with the remaining 10% being donated to the Community Fund.

Since the balance sheet date a Wr5 note has been introduced. Again 10% of all funds redeemed are donated to the Community Fund.

All Wren currency in the community at the balance sheet date is redeemable and as such a creditor of £3,352 (2013, £1,980) has been included. The creditor movement has been calculated at 90% of the currency income recognised at the balance sheet date less that which has been reimbursed in the year.

11. COMMUNITY FUND

In January 2012 WREN launched its community fund. The fund is designed to award monies to local community groups each year. Community groups are invited to apply for various levels of award from the fund with selection being controlled by the members who vote through a ballot system.

The remaining £2,250 relating to the previous years community fund has now been paid to Wadebridge Youth Project.

A community fund of £5,000 was agreed for the year to 31 March 2014. The successful candidates were;

"We have an ever increasing demand for assistance but it's not just about food. People in need can be allocated social housing but often find that when they move in the accommodation doesn't have furniture or curtains or even light bulbs! We will use the money in our crisis fund to provide a small home starter pack so that people moving into an empty property have access to basic household items including things like toilet paper."

12. POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

The Company registered for VAT with effect from 1 April 2014. VAT of £82.14 relating to expenditure included in these accounts has been reclaimed in the first VAT return to 30th June 2014.

Since the balance sheet date unrestricted funds have been transferred to the restricted Ashden Fund in order to restore a balance of £5,000 in accordance with the funding agreement.
